The annual celebration focuses on the value Catholic education provides to students and the contributions it makes to the local and world community.


Academy activities ran the gamut from the Living in Faith Experience Mass and Walk to races and games in the Lower School, all following this year's theme,


Kula began her tenure at the Academy in 1985 when she joined the school as a High School mathematics teacher.

Swimmers find stroke

The Academy was well represented in the *Interscholastic League of Honolulu (ILH) Swimming Championships* on January 29 and 30 at Punahou School.

Competing under the "flag" of *Pac-Five*, sophomore *LeGrand Pound* (below) won the 100-yard freestyle in 52.03 and swam a personal best 24.14 in the 50-yard freestyle, finishing second in the event.

Sophomores *Julia Oehlers* and *Kaianali'i Rosa-Grace* also ranked in the top 20 in their events, the 100-yard backstroke and the 50-yard freestyle event, respectively.

With solid times garnered during the ILH season, Pound, Oehlers, Rosa-Grace and teammates *Angela Lowell* and *Jadelyn Warren* qualified to compete in the 200-freestyle and 200-individual medley relays in the *State Championships*, slated for February 12 and 13 at Kamehameha Schools-Hawai'i. Pound also qualified to compete for the State titles in various events.

Also swimming for Pac-Five, under Coach Mark Tanigawa, are Olivia Bruce, Tiana Coen and Milena Ordonez, while Kelci Deuz, Nathalie Kerrigan, Fiona Sun and Jennalyn Sun participate on the Intermediate level.
