Lancers crowned League champions in two sports

In recent weeks, the Academy has had a great deal to celebrate with members of Lancer athletics teams achieving success and taking the spotlight.

SPORTER AIR RIFLERY

The Lancers had eight shooters qualifying for the Interscholastic League of Honolulu (ILH) Sporter Air Riflery Championships on October 15, and the group came away with an astonishing 11 medals!

After a long day of intense competition, junior **Dorothy Sanidad** outlasted her closest challenger to take the overall **ILH Varsity Champion-ship** title, finishing first in



the standing round and fourth in the kneeling portion.

Junior *Angelica Castro* placed eighth in the League finals, and senior *Kaycee Selga* moved into the top ten overall. On the *Junior Varsity (JV)* level, five Lancers competed for the ILH title. Sophomore *Clarissa De Smet*, buoyed by second and third-place scores in the standing and kneeling events, respectively, took second overall, and classmate *Logan Shiroma* shot a personal best 492 for third overall.

Also performing well were JV shooters *Lauren Matsukawa*, *Dallas Martinez* and *Brainna Ho*. Sanidad, Castro, Selga, De Smet and Matsukawa also competed in the State Championships on October 25.

CHEERLEADING

Motivated by victories in the first two *Interscholastic League of Honolulu (ILH)* competitions, the *Junior Varsity* (*JV*) *cheerleading* squad (*below left*) entered the league championships on October 28 with momentum on their side and outdistanced their nearest foe by almost 75 points to take the ILH title crown.

The *Intermediate Lancer cheerleaders* (below right) also won the league championship title for their level, surpassing rival Kamehameha Schools by just three points!
