#### Making fast friends at Ranch

On October 22, the Academy's second graders traveled to **Kualoa Ranch Private Nature Reserve** in Windward Oahu to explore its dynamic setting and learn more about its environmental and agricultural enterprises. Specifically, they immersed themselves in the inner workings of the Reserve's working cattle ranch which fosters more than 600 head of cattle, 120 horses and 200 sheep.

In addition to the cows, horses and sheep, the students also learned about techniques and requirements for caring for the other resident animals on the 4,000-acre property.

They even had the opportunity to interact with a few, including some unique species, such as a llama, the pair of squawking geese and the pot-belly pig. And, they got "hands-on," feeling and comparing the different types of covering each boasts, such as a turtle's shell.








### Tides and typography focus of quests

The fourth grade scientists have had a busy fall, full of observations and handson activities related to some of the unique geological, geographical and historical aspects of the Island of Oahu.

During one of their first off-campus forays in October, the students toured **East Oahu** and focused on finding the region's unique land features.

They not only did observations and assessments, (right) like at the lookout to view "Rabbit Island," but wondered the beach at Awawamalu Beach Park, also known as "Sandy's." Here (above), they took an upclose examination of the

rocks, sand and soil of that ecosystem.



During another scientific learning trip on October 25 *(below)*, the fourth graders traveled to *He'eia Fishpond* on the Windward side of the Island. This fishpond is a unique setting adapted by the ancient Hawaiians to not only catch fish for sustenance but to promote the health and sustainability of the ecosystem.

During their explorations, they examined the fishpond wall and surrounding terrain, located several different types of crab and fish, learned the importance of cloud observation in the area to predict the weather and completed some service work to help restore the fishpond to its original state.

#### Getting new view at forecasting weather

The Academy's fifth graders got a behind-the-scenes, in-depth view of the intricacies of weather forecasting during a visit to the **KITV 4 News** studio on October 17.

They were taken on this weather "journey" by (right) **Paul Drewes**, one of the station's meteorologists, and **Tesia Worley**, an anchor on the morning show.

Drewes took the students into the weather broadcast area and gave them a "primer" on the special tools used by meteorologists on-air to televise different parts of their forecast, including *(below)* the "blue screen" on which graphics are added and the "official clicker" he uses to switch

screens and information displays like the "Seven-Day Forecast."

During this (right), visit the students also were thrilled to test some of the equipment, and some even conducted their own weather news segment!









#### **Getting in spirit of STEM challenge**

The **Junior Kindergartners** in **Sandy Arnobit's** class got "in the spooky spirit" during their **Halloween**-themed challenge focused on developing their Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) skills.

For this activity, based on the book **"Five Little Pumpkins,"** the students tapped into their creativity and ingenuity to build a gate using only the limited materials provided. The challenge – five pumpkins had to "sit" on the gate, so it needed to be sturdy, allow adequate room for all of them and enough coverage so they would not roll or fall off.

After much concentration and proper testing, most of the students solved the task – just in time to "trick-or-treat!"

#### Speaking for first time

On October 20, members of the Academy's **Speech Team** in grades five to eight participated at the **'Iolani Speech Tournament**, their first competition of the year.

While this was a non-tabulated tournament and no awards were given, the judges did rate each speaker for their verbal performance.

The Academy participants, including a number of "rookies" to the Speech Team, earned quite a few "Superior" rankings for their entries in the Duo Interpretation, Storytelling and Impromptu Speaking categories.

#### Learning while on trail

The Academy's **International Students** engaged a different learning experience on October 24 when they went on a field trip to **Makapu'u Lighthouse**.

#### **Pushing safety for pedestrians**
