## Graduates return and reflect

Fortytwo recent graduates returned to campus on January 6 for the annual Alumnae Forum, a useful resource for the Academy's future collegebound students, who begin prepping



for the college process in Junior High.

In small groups, they met with each High School division in a panel setting, answering questions, sharing about their collegiate experiences and offering "words of wisdom" about transitioning to the university education realm.

According to *College Counselor Randy Fong*, the most important takeaways the graduates shared included:

- Research college choices before senior year and apply early;
- Start now "waking up early, doing homework and developing relationships with teachers;"
- Finish senior year on a strong note since colleges review final transcripts;
- Learn to live with dorm roommates by respecting one another and understanding individual differences and living styles;
- Often, financial aid dictates which college students attend, so research and complete the financial aid application process early.


At the end of each semester, students in grades seven to 12 evaluate their classes through on-line, anonymous surveys.

### CyberLancers combat hackers during challenge

On December 4, the Academy's two *CyberLancers* teams completed the second round of the *Cyber-Patriot competition*, which challenges students to demonstrate their cybersecurity knowledge.

During this round, each team had six hours to tighten security and remove malware, viruses and areas for hackers to exploit on three different computer systems – a Windows Vista workstation, a Windows 2008 server and an Ubuntu 14 workstation.

Before the 10 p.m. deadline, the teams also had to complete a Cisco networking challenge quiz.

Based on the results, the CyberLancers may move on to the next phase of competition early this



year.

Participating students included freshmen Aiyana Arnobit and Stella Supall, juniors Christina Chen, Leona Domingo, Kaitlin Pang and Shailyn Wilson and seniors Weiyi Huang, Janelle Inao and Asenita Tuiafitu.

## Fourth graders find facts about fishpond's features

On December 15, the fourth graders went to *He'eia Fishpond* in *He'eia Uli* on the Windward side of Oahu to explore its history and the unique and advanced forms of aquaculture it employs.

Built by the ancient Hawaiians 800 years ago, the students discovered how adult fish are herded or trapped in the Pond, while allowing baby fish, or pua, to mature.

The students also worked together to fill buckets with coral and rock to fill the puka, or hole, in the 1.3-mile wall surrounding the fishpond.

In all, the students, including *(right) Amber Wolfe, Diana Lee* and *Reece Machida*, added 200 buckets to the restoration effort!
